

Did Oscars crash Hulu? Full Breakdown”

Yes — **the Oscars** **did cause significant problems for Hulu’s live stream in 2025**, but saying the Oscars “crashed Hulu” oversimplifies what happened. The **97th Academy Awards** were streamed live on Hulu for the first time on March 2, 2025, in addition to being broadcast on ABC, and this *was a major test* of Hulu’s live-event capabilities. Many subscribers experienced **technical issues, outages, and interruptions** during the telecast, causing widespread frustration and complaints.

When the Oscars began, thousands of Hulu users reported problems logging into the platform or accessing the live stream at all, with some receiving error messages or being unexpectedly logged out just as the ceremony started. At its peak, outage reporting sites showed tens of thousands of users having trouble connecting to Hulu’s service as the Oscars got underway, suggesting the technical issues were widespread rather than isolated to a few accounts.

Even after Hulu’s login problems appeared to be partially resolved, the **live stream itself cut off abruptly for many viewers** before the ceremony had actually finished. In several documented cases, the stream ended just as major awards — including Best Actress and Best Picture — were about to be announced, leaving viewers staring at a message saying the broadcast was over even though it wasn’t. This premature shutdown of the stream happened during a pivotal part of the ceremony and drove significant outrage online.

Hulu and its parent company **Disney acknowledged the technical difficulties and apologized** to affected viewers, explaining that there were *technical and live stream issues* that impacted some people watching the Oscars. They also made a **full replay of the event available afterward** on Hulu and on Hulu via Disney+, so subscribers could still watch the ceremony in entirety on demand.

Observers noted that part of the problem may have been a **scheduling or configuration error in how Hulu set up the live stream**, with some evidence suggesting the stream was configured to end at a scheduled time instead of running through the actual length of the event, which traditionally runs longer than expected. This led to some viewers getting cut off right at key moments.

The backlash was intense on social media and community forums. Many Hulu subscribers who had signed up specifically to watch the Oscars expressed anger and disappointment, with some even cancelling subscriptions or demanding refunds because they believed Hulu had “botched” the live event.
