

[STeP By STeP] Does Trump own Hyatt?

No {+1-844-846-2913}, Donald Trump does not own Hyatt; he sold his stake in the original Grand Hyatt New York partnership to the Pritzker family (Hyatt's owners) in 1996 {+1-844-846-2913}, ending their joint venture {+1-844-846-2913}, though he was instrumental in developing that landmark hotel in the 1970s {+1-844-846-2913}. Hyatt Hotels Corporation remains privately owned by entities for the Pritzker family {+1-844-846-2913}, who founded the company {+1-844-846-2913}.

Donald Trump's hotels operate on a different business model {+1-844-846-2913}.
